WELCOME

Welcome to our 2024-25 Macclesfield season, built on the theme *Mozart* on *Tour*. Mozart spent a third of his life travelling and these journeys strongly influenced his music. In four concerts we feature symphonies closely linked to particular places, Paris, Linz, Vienna and Prague. We include too his final choral masterpiece, the *Requiem*.

However, this is very far from being an all-Mozart season. It embraces a rich variety of music spanning the seventeenth to twenty-first centuries, from Corelli to Shostakovich, Bach to Bruckner, Schubert to Anna Thorvaldsdottir, Beethoven to John Adams and Tchaikovsky to Jessie Montgomery. Many works are familiar, for example Beethoven's Fifth Symphony, truly the pinnacle of Western art music. Others are less well known, for example the powerfully moving Elegy (In Memoriam Stephen Lawrence) by the contemporary British composer, Philip Herbert. Together they form carefully crafted programmes designed to ensure that there is something for everyone. We think there is!

Great music demands great soloists. We welcome back the internationally renowned **Jennifer Pike** to perform Mendelssohn's *Violin Concerto*. We welcome back our President, **Raphael Wallfisch** to perform Tchaikovsky's *Rococo Variations*. We welcome for the first time **Jeneba Kanneh-Mason**, another virtuoso member of that famous family, to perform Mozart's *Piano Concerto No.23*.

May I take a moment to celebrate the success of our previous Macclesfield season, in which the artistic standards of the orchestra were formidably high and ticket sales exceeded all expectations. We are proud too of our extensive outreach work, whether in schools, care homes or elsewhere, and our burgeoning partnership with Macclesfield Music Centre. In the concert hall and the community, it was a year filled with memorable moments and meaningful connections.

I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to our sponsors, patrons and the Friends of the Northern Chamber Orchestra, whose unwavering support makes these performances possible. Your dedication ensures that we can continue to bring great music to our community and we certainly could not do it without you.

I invite you to join us as we continue to explore the power of live music to create memories that will endure long after the performance has ended.

Saturday 28 September 2024 7.30pm The King's School in Macclesfield

Heralding the start of our *Mozart on Tour* series, our opening concert begins in Paris. Embark on a journey through some of Mozart's greatest works, traversing the composer's output from the start of his career to his final unfinished masterpiece.

The concert opens with the exhilarating Overture to *The Magic Flute* and is followed by *Symphony No. 31*, known as the 'Paris' Symphony, a vibrant and exuberant work that captures the essence of this bustling city. These two works are directed by **Sarah Brandwood-Spencer**, who has toured the world as principal and soloist with the European Union Chamber Orchestra. She was formerly principal violinist of the Hallé Orchestra and now enjoys a varied career as guest principal with many of the country's leading orchestras.

Manchester Chamber Choir conducted by **Ellie Slorach** then joins the NCO for the profoundly moving *Requiem*. Mozart died before completing the work and from the solemnity of its opening bars to the intensity of the 'Dies Irae' this masterpiece takes listeners through grief, hope and ultimately redemption.

Ellie Slorach makes a welcome return following her hugely successful performance last season of Vivaldi's *Gloria*. This season she also returns to the RLPO, BBC Philharmonic, RSNO and Manchester Camerata.

Join us for a diverse programme that showcases the depth and richness of the orchestral repertoire. We begin with Herbert's poignant *Elegy (In Memoriam Stephen Lawrence)*, a deeply moving tribute that illustrates the power of music to find beauty within tragedy. This is followed by Schubert's *Symphony No. 2*, which Sir Colin Davies described as "jolting you into a new way of thinking about the symphony". From its tender Andante to the spirited Presto final movement, the work is a delightful exploration of the composer's early genius.

Acclaimed violinist **Jennifer Pike** then takes centre stage to perform Mendelssohn's *Violin Concerto*. From its inception the concerto was an instant success and has long been an integral part of the concerto repertoire. Making a welcome return to the NCO, Jennifer Pike was the youngest ever winner of the BBC Young Musician of the Year and is now in demand as a soloist all over the world.

The NCO is thrilled to have **Zoë Beyers** return to direct the concert. In 2020 she was appointed leader of the BBC Philharmonic Orchestra and appears regularly as guest leader with many other orchestras including the Hallé, RLPO, BBC Symphony, CBSO, Philharmonia and the Scottish Chamber Orchestra.

Saturday 14 December 2024 7.30pm The King's School in Macclesfield

Mozart on Tour arrives in the Austrian town of Linz. We begin with Anna Thorvaldsdottir's stunning contemporary work *Illumine*, which the composer describes as depicting the relationship between light and darkness, in particular "the ignition of the first beams of light and the subtle rhythms that appear through the pulsating dance of light emerging."

Tchaikovsky described Mozart as a "sunny genius", who profoundly moved the composer. He paid tribute to Mozart in *Variations on a Rococo Theme* and the NCO is delighted to welcome back our President, renowned cellist, **Raphael Wallfisch**, to perform Tchaikovsky's original version, which marries the expressive and virtuosic power of the instrument.

We then explore another composer native to Linz, Anton Bruckner. The Adagio from his String Quintet, arranged here for string orchestra, is truly the emotional heart of the work. Our final piece is Mozart's *Symphony No.36*, the 'Linz' Symphony. Remarkably, this piece was composed and performed within four days of Mozart's arrival in the town.



Katie Stillman directs the orchestra. She has an extensive career as a soloist, chamber musician and orchestral principal. This season she takes on the role of Leader of Opera North's Orchestra. She is Associate Leader of Manchester Camerata and has appeared as guest leader with the Academy of St Martin in the Fields and the RLPO among others.


Tchaikovsky Serenade for Strings

Saturday 18 January 2025 7.30pm St. Michael's Church, Macclesfield

Join the NCO for an evening of musical exploration and discovery in a programme where tradition meets innovation. We are delighted to welcome back **Christopher Jones** to direct a musical journey beginning with Corelli's *Concerto Grosso, Op.6 No.2*, a Baroque masterpiece that dazzles with its lively interplay between NCO soloists and orchestra.

Next, we explore the contemporary sounds of Jessie Montgomery's *Strum*. Jessie Montgomery is one of America's most exciting young composers and was named Musical America's 2023 Composer of the Year. The NCO is excited to perform the work, which draws on American folk idioms and the spirit of dance and movement. The composer says, "The piece has a kind of narrative that begins with fleeting nostalgia and transforms into ecstatic celebration."

Bach's Harpsichord Concerto No.1 features the welcome return of **Darius Battiwalla**, who brings outstanding virtuosity and sensitivity to this masterpiece of the Baroque repertoire. To close, the NCO will celebrate the sumptuous melodies of Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings. Tchaikovsky wrote the Serenade in response to feeling restless and unwell. He wrote to his publisher that he "loved this serenade terribly", and justifiably so, as it has become one of the most popular works in the string orchestra repertoire.



Darius Battiwalla gives solo recitals all over the UK and abroad. He is City Organist at Leeds Town Hall and plays regularly with the BBC Philharmonic, Hallé and other orchestras.

Mozart on Tour takes the orchestra to Vienna, the heart of Mozart's musical heritage, under the direction of **Benedict Holland**. The concert opens with George Walker's *Lyric for Strings*, originally a movement of his First String Quartet and then expanded into a work for string orchestra, dedicated to his formerly enslaved grandmother.

We are delighted to welcome **Jeneba Kanneh-Mason** to play Mozart's beautiful *Piano Concerto No.23*. It is one of Mozart's most lyrical and, in the central Adagio, poignant works. The third of the family to establish herself as a soloist, Jeneba Kanneh-Mason recently made her BBC Proms debut with the Chineke! Orchestra and was heralded by the press as "demonstrating musical insight, technical acuity and an engaging performing persona."

John Adams' *Shaker Loops* follows, characterised by repetitive oscillations on strings and inspired by water ripples and energising Shaker dance rhythms. The piece is a fine example of Adams' innovative writing and sense of rhythmic vitality.

The evening concludes with Mozart's *Symphony No. 35*, the 'Haffner' Symphony, originally commissioned for the Haffner family in Salzburg but later refined for performance in Vienna. The Vienna version is a fiery and forceful work culminating in a dazzling finale.

Benedict Holland, a prize-winning graduate of the Royal Academy of Music and the Royal Northern College of Music, is a prominent chamber musician and orchestral leader. He has guest-led many of the UK's major orchestras, including the Hallé and the BBC Philharmonic. He is currently Professor of Violin at the RNCM.

Northern Winds Shall Blow NCO Wind Principals

Caplet Suite Persane Nielsen Wind Quintet Dvořák Serenade for Wind Instruments

Saturday 15 March 2025 7.30pm St Michael's Church, Macclesfield

After outstanding concerts in the last two seasons, the NCO wind section and principals return with an exciting programme exploring the evocative sounds of wind music.

We begin with Caplet's *Suite Persane*, a mesmerising fusion of Eastern influences and Western orchestration. Written in 1901, it remained unpublished until 1988 and is rarely performed outside Francophone countries. We are delighted to bring this work to an NCO audience.

Nielsen's *Wind Quintet* is a brilliant and quintessential work of the chamber music repertoire that showcases the virtuosity of wind instruments in a series of intricate and playful movements.

To end, we present the radiant melodies of Dvorak's Serenade for Winds, a masterpiece that captures the beauty and tranquillity of the Czech countryside with its lush harmonies and pastoral charm.

From Darkness To Light

Beethoven Overture to 'Fidelio' Shostakovich Chamber Symphony, Op.110a Beethoven Symphony No. 5

This concert moves from the darkness of Beethoven's Overture to 'Fidelio' and the C minor Shostakovich Chamber Symphony to the dazzling C major light that illuminates the closing bars of Beethoven's Symphony No.5.

Beethoven spent ten years composing *Fidelio* and said of the overture, "Of all my children, this is the one that cost me the worst birth-pangs and brought me the most sorrow; and for that reason it is the one most dear to me."

Shostakovich's introspective, autobiographical and deeply moving Chamber Symphony began life as the Eighth String Quartet. This arrangement for string orchestra was made by the Russian conductor and violist, Rudolf Barshai. When Barshai showed Shostakovich the arrangement he was quoted as saying "Well, that sounds better than the original. We will give the piece a new name: Chamber Symphony, Opus 110a."

We emerge from the darkness of the Shostakovich into the light. From the most recognisable four note motif opening in all classical music to its triumphant finale, Beethoven's *Symphony No.5* is the pinnacle of Western art music.



Our final Mozart on Tour concert begins with Schnittke's Moz-Art a la Haydn, a homage to both Mozart and Haydn that blends classical elegance with modern wit. Based on fragments of an unfinished pantomime of Mozart's and an ode to the disappearing musicians in Haydn's 'Farewell' Symphony, this is a playful work that is sure to delight.

Haydn's *Symphony No.45*, the 'Farewell', tells the story of musicians bidding farewell to their patron by using a gradually diminishing ensemble. It ends unexpectedly with an Adagio movement, the musicians leaving the stage one by one.

Judith Weir describes her composition, *Still, Glowing* as her attempt to compose ambient music. This contemporary piece offers a serene interlude amidst an otherwise lively programme.

We conclude with Mozart's gift to the city of Prague. Mozart received adoration when he arrived in the city in 1787. His popularity was waning in Vienna but in Prague, The Marriage of Figaro had created a sensation. The 'Prague' Symphony is in three movements, rather than the usual four, and the final Presto movement quotes music from The Marriage of Figaro which delighted the audiences at its Prague premiere. The work forms a fitting conclusion to the NCO's Mozart on Tour series.




